STAY VIGILANT TO STOP COVID IN ITS TRACKS.

The county council is encouraging people to go forward with caution, as Covid cases continue to rise.

Monday the 19th July was the next step in the corona virus summer 2021 roadmap, which will continue to play a key role in managing the virus and reducing the risk of it mutating and new variants developing. It's not the last step in overcoming Covid and with cases increasing, people must be encouraged to move forward with caution.

Getting both doses of the COVID – 19 vaccination remains our best chance of protecting ourselves from the most severe symptoms of COVID-19 and those people who are most at risk from the virus. Rapid testing will also help to stop Covid in its tracks whilst reassuring you that you are still doing everything you can to ensure you don't pass the virus onto those you care about.

Although no longer a legal requirement, face coverings, social distancing and regular hand washing remain effective ways to help the risk of spreading COVID.

£2 MILLION BUILD BACK BETTER FUND SET TO LAUNCH.

A £2 million Build Back Better Fund is set to be launched by the county later this month, subject to a Cabinet sign off on 21 July. The fund has been developed to help communities recover and rebuild from the impacts of Covid-19. The fund is set to be allocated evenly across the county's 53 divisions to allow each county councillor to support bids in their area and to ensure the benefits of the investment are shared across Gloucestershire. Each councillor will be allocated a total of £40,000 in grants to support their local area.

Recognising the diverse nature and needs of Gloucestershire's communities and neighborhoods, criteria for bids is likely to consist of key themes including community health and well-being'

RECYCLING METAL REALLY MATTERS.

In a countywide social media campaign, residents are being encouraged to recycle their metal packaging to make every can count.

Metal can be recycled endlessly so the county and all six councils have teamed up with Metal Matters to highlight the benefits of recycling our metal packaging to inspire everyone to get involved and do their bit.

With more than 12 billion items of aluminium packaging alone sold every year in the UK, householders are being encouraged to recycle their cans, foil empty aerosols, trays, tubes, and metal screw tops. Every district in the county provides a frequent and convenient door-to-door recycling service so it's never been easier to recycle our metal packaging; and once recycled, it takes around 60days for a drinks can to return to the supermarket shelf.

EFFICIENT AND GREENER SCHEME FOR FOOD WASTE

The County Council is to award a contract with Ubico to take Gloucestershire's food waste to a recycling plant in Bishops Cleve. All six district councils in the county provide a weekly kerbside food waste collection service for their residents and it is the county councils job to recycle this waste. Currently four of the districts have their food waste taken to the plant by different providers but under new streamlined plans it would be collected by just one company.

STATE OF THE ART 999 SYSTEM IN PLACE AT GLOUCESTERSHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE.

A new 999 system which uses the latest technology has been implemented at Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) enabling crews to continuing providing the best possible service to the county.

The system called Vision 5 can locate where a member of the public is calling from without the need for any extra software. Mobile phone signals can be pinpointed within 50 meters of their location and landlines identified with their addresses when calling. GFRS is the only county-run fire and rescue service to have switched to Vision 5, the only others in the country using it are London, South Wales and Merseyside who are much larger services in comparison.

FIRE STATION TO BECOME SEARCH AND RESCUE CHARITY'S NEW COTSWOLD BASE.

A growing partnership between Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) and the Severn Area Rescue Association (SARA) has led to the search and rescue charity being given a new base.

It has been offered the use of the premises at Cirencester Fire Station by GFRS to help SARA establish a base in the Cotswolds.

IT'S THE REAL DEAL - TRADING STANDARDS AND CIRENCESTER MARKET BACK SCHEME TO PROTECT CONSUMERS.

A national campaign to stop shoppers being duped into buying rip-off fakes of designer goods and other illicit items is being backed by Gloucestershire County Council's trading standards department, Cirencester Town Council and Cotswold Markets.

BE A 'WILD WORLD HERO' WITH GLOUCESTERSHIRE LIBRARIES

The national event led by the Reading Agency began on Saturday 10 July and runs until Friday 10 September, with the aim of encouraging children to enjoy reading and visiting their library.

Children are invited to borrow at least six books over three visits and are offered rewards and opportunities to get involved with many other events and activities.

This year's theme is 'Wild World \heroes' which aims to inspire families and children to enjoy reading as well as to get outside to visit their local nature reserves and wildlife parks. Nearly10,000 families took part in the Summer Reading Challenge in 2019, when it last took place in Gloucestershire's libraries. As well as borrowing books, children can take away the popular makeaway packs which include crafty bits and pieces, plus instructions for families to make their own nature-inspired crafts at home.
